



Introduction









LSDS highlights

- The Livelihoods and Skills Development Sector aims to operationalize the 'Government of Bangladesh-United Nations Framework on Skills Development for Rohingya refugees/FDMNs and Host Communities', endorsed by the Government in August 2022.
- The Sector will build the skills and capacities of Rohingya refugees commensurate with livelihood opportunities available in Rakhine State, to support voluntary and sustainable repatriation in Myanmar when conditions are conducive.
- Refugees will be supported to access to livelihood opportunities by enabling them to apply acquired skills and capacities through volunteer engagement either within the Sector or by fostering partnerships and collaborations with relevant sectors and implementing partners.
- The Sector will, in close coordination with the Government, complement the existing support for vulnerable Bangladeshi households in Ukhiya and Teknaf through vocational skills training. Institutional mechanisms and the skills of training providers will also be enhanced. Livelihood opportunities will include bolstering access to economic opportunities, localizing production, enhancing market linkages within the camps and sustainability.

SKILLS DEVELOPMENT

LSDS needs overview for 2024

- Competency Based Training (Vocational Training) introduced and piloted in the Camps in 2023 (curriculum adapted from MNQF or AQRF). However, low level of literacy of the population age 18+ affects enrolment into the vocational training. The existing literacy programs are not suitable for those above the age of 18 (targeted age group of LSDS beneficiaries is 18+).
- As per MSNA conducted in 2023, 71% of refugee households reported facing barriers to income opportunities. However, out of the remaining 29%, only 5% reported volunteer engagement as their source of household income, and 14% reported income from small-business and own production.
- MSNA 2023 confirmed a high unemployment rate remaining among the workforce in the host communities (32%), particularly youth and women. The Sector will support activities focused on developing sustainable employment and entrepreneurship-oriented skills.



LSDS response

- A new Activity Group 'Accelerated Adult Learning (AAL)' has been introduced for Partners are encouraged to take up AAL, so that there could be increment in the numbers of eligible beneficiaries for Vocational Training in the Camps.
- 'Non-formal technical training' will be an Activity Group in 2024, under the Objective 1, and training packages will be of 120 hrs duration. The skills that are to be developed under non-formal technical training are those specified in the Skills Development Framework endorsed by the Government.
- As for the Host Community, the Sector will support activities focused on developing sustainable employment and entrepreneurship-oriented skills Research and Analysis related to LSDS is added as a new Activity Group for Host Community for planning market-driven sustainable employment and entrepreneurship opportunities.




Summary of rationalization efforts


- Sector is promoting common approaches and common systems (volunteers' ToRs; guidelines for selection of beneficiaries; minimum standard packages...)
- Convergence of service packages is encouraged (if a partner is providing AAL, skills development) programme, they should also ensure volunteer engagement or employment/self employment opportunities)
- Partners are constantly reminded on avoiding duplications of efforts in camp/block level, it is under continuous monitoring with 5W tracker
- Established referral pathways between the sectors in 2024
