Justification from Implementing partners:

CWW: Camp-26

Factors for low admission:

- ✓ Camp-26 is quite scattered and there are some blocks which are adjacent to Nayapara registered camp (Nayapara RC) and far from Camp-26 INF. Out of 11 Blocks camp 26 is covering 5 blocks(A,B,C,D,E), Nayapara RC Site 01 is covering 3 Blocks(F,G,H) and Nayapara RC site 02 is covering remaining 3 blocks(G-Ext, H-Ext, I-Ext) from last couple of years. Therefore, the achievement for Camp-26 is showing less while achievement for NYP RC showing bit higher than the target. If we consider the individual SAM admission from 1st January to 31st December 2023, we can see that only camp 26 admitted 297. Where Nayapara RC Site 01 admitted from Camp 26 part is 76 and Nayapara RC Site 02 admitted from Camp 26 part is 199. So, the total cumulative admission of SAM of camp 26 is 572. As well the actual OTP admission rate is 105.7%
- ✓ In TSFP case it is also same. Therefore, the actual TSFP U5 admission by only camp 26 part is 1303.TSFP U5 admission by Nayapara RC site 01 from camp 26 part is 289 and by Nayapara RC site 02 is 482. So, the total cumulative TSFP U5 admission of camp 26 is 2074(97.9%).
- ✓ MAM PLW admission from the individual camp 26 part is 85. MAM PLW admission by Nayapara RC site 01 from Camp 26 part is 19 and by Nayapara RC site 02 from Camp 26 part is 17. In cumulative the MAM PLW admission of camp 26 is 121 (90.3%)

Action points

Need specific catchment area demarcation for these two camps (specially, for those blocks) and based on this the target should be set for these two camps while sector setting / revising the target.

✓ Concern will verify the beneficiaries that receive ration from other sites and also will give the information to the sector about on other site who is providing the support.

WVI: Camp- 5

Factors for low admission:

- ✓ Inappropriate measurement by volunteers was a crucial factor for not being identified of the possible MAM children. Besides, the monitoring gaps from the responsible person observed which made the volunteer irrefutable. Moreover, the measurement at facility level was poor as well.
- ✓ Throughout the year most of the time responsible position like, nurse position was vacant.

Action points

- ✓ Strength the outreach activity monitoring
- ✓ Regular supervise and monitor the measurement by using scoring sheet.
- ✓ Ensure necessary OJT for the measurement volunteers.
- ✓ Timely onboard the vital role-playing staff.
- ✓ By mid-March WVI will ensure the recruitment of all field level volunteers & staffs

GK: Camp- 1W

- ✓ The camp is close to host community and has access to diversified foods and their health service seeking behavior is better compared to other camps (as informed by GK supervisors who worked in outgoing partner in 2023.
- ✓ The nutrition sites did not have adequate numbers of CNVs, and Centre based volunteers
 (1 CNV to cover >400 HHs instead of standard 200 HHs and only 9 center based volunteers
 instead of 15). This hampered active case findings.

Action points

✓ Ensure placement of minimum standard number of volunteers both at outreach and center level from the beginning of the year for the incoming implementing partner.

6. Update on SAG and TWG membership

- ✓ For SAG membership 2024 from INGO's two were elected and they are Concern & WVI.
- ✓ For CMAM TWG, SHED is selected for Co-Lead. WVI & CWW shared their interest & commitment for taking the responsibility of TWG as Lead. NS will share the voting form by 3rd Feb.
- ✓ SHED will share the focal point details for CMAM TWG within 1st Week of March
- ✓ For IYCF TWG, GK will provide their support as Co-Lead. SCI & UNICEF shared their interest to support as Lead. NS will share the voting form by 3rd Feb.
- ✓ For AIM TWG, both ACF and UNICEF shows their interest to support as Lead. So, all participants agreed for voting. As there was NO partner interested to be the co-lead, so ACF and UNICEF agreed that the runner up will be the co-lead by default.

7. Update on Funding Analysis 2023 & 2024

In 2023 JRP, Nutrition Sector partners have secured around \$33.5 M (84% of funding appealed) as of December 2023 whereas in 2024 JRP \$13.4 M (30% of funding appealed) has been secured as of February 2024. NS with its appealing partners thank all the donors for supporting nutrition to provide life-saving assistances to the most vulnerable groups including children and PLW at camps and host community.

One of the concerns that was raised by NS during the discussion was to be accurate and sensitive while sending the funding status to ISCG and Nutrition Sector. During the 2024 JRP project submission, it was estimated that around 40% of requesting funding for 2024 JRP was secured by the partners while during the financial analysis in February it's 30%.

8. AOB

- ✓ Nutrition Sector will arrange the disability inclusion training in April with support of HI.
- ✓ Fire Preparedness Assessment tool will be shared by NS within 3rd March.
- ✓ NS and all partners agreed that in INF only English & Burmese language containing IEC materials will be used. It is to be recalled last year we agreed to remove all IEC materials which contained Bangla language from INF. Nutrition Managers are expected to verify that all IEC material in Banga has already been removed from INF.
- ✓ All partners agreed again that all child who are found with MUAC less than 13.5cm will be referred to INF.
- ✓ By mid-March WVI will ensure the recruitment of all field level volunteers & staffs
- ✓ HI & UNICEF had a meeting on 27th of Feb. HI will find a premise near to INF for their Stimulation Therapy (ST) activity.
- ✓ All partners agreed to do a mid-year review for all TWG's.
- ✓ GNC regional consultation meeting will be held on 13th of march. All partners need to complete the registration by 7th of March.
- ✓ Elena Rivora has briefed the participants on the ongoing Partner's Capacity Assessment exercises and greatly appreciated for their collaboration.
