- Skills gaps are slowing economic growth in Chattogram Cox's Bazaar due to
  - Workers' skills gaps
  - Enterprise capability gaps
- ► Lack of coordination between public institutions, TVET providers, Private sector and social partners to develop Workbased learning and employment support services
- Disconnect between training offers and enterprises' needs
- ► Employer reluctance to hire TVET graduates
- ► Lack of qualified and certified trainers including females

Since 2021, WFP is linking local producers/aggregation centres to both local markets and WFP-contracted retailers of E-voucher outlets in refugee camps. This links micro-producers from the Bangladeshi communities to the refugee population, playing a key role in enhancing social cohesion between both communities, boost local agricultural production, and creates access to new markets to local farmers and producers.
