Population

- Refugees: Entire refugee population in need of humanitarian assistance (Cox's Bazar and Bhasan Char)
- Host communities: Based on Sector-specific vulnerability/needs analysis and to help maintain social cohesion, with consideration of complementary development programming for Cox's Bazar





JRP 2025 Strategic Objectives

- Work towards the sustainable and voluntary repatriation of Rohingya refugees/FDMNs to Myanmar
- Strengthen the protection and resilience of Rohingya refugee/FDMN women, men, girls, and boys
- Beliver life-saving assistance to populations in need
- Foster the well-being of host communities
- Strengthen disaster risk management and combat the effects of climate change





- That demonstrate relevance, responsiveness, accountability, to the different **needs**, **experiences**, **capacities** and **roles** of women, girls, men, and boys of different age, gender-diverse, and persons with disabilities in the Rohingya Refugees in the Camps

Example | Gender analysis (max. 150 words)

Gender inequalities in education in the Rohingya refugee context are characterized by limited access to education for girls due to cultural norms and economic constraints. For instance, preliminary data from ISNA 2024 indicated 9.5% of girl children as doing 7 hours or more of domestic & care work per day compared to just 4.6% among boys.

Early marriage and safety concerns further hinder girls' education. Shortages of female teachers and inadequate facilities exacerbate these challenges.

According to XYZ study, efforts to address these inequalities may involve community engagement, recruiting and training female teachers, creating safe learning environments, policy changes, and flexible learning opportunities for girls.





Gender with Age Marker (GAM) step by step


Questions on the **design** and *monitoring* of your project will generate your score (0-4):

- 1. Gender analysis Disaggregated data
- 2. Tailored assistance Targeted or mainstreamed activities; coordination
- 3. Adequate participation (influence of participants) CFRM, CwC
- **4. Benefits** Evaluation of satisfaction for different project participants, addressing problems

FAQ: Partner Status and JRP inclusion

Q Do organizations need to be registered in Bangladesh to be included in the JRP? **A** Yes.

Q Can any organization appeal through the JRP?

A An appealing partner is an organization raising funds directly from member states/countries through the JRP as part of a sector within the refugee response in Bangladesh. This does not include partners receiving or raising funds through the UN, NGOs, private sector, religious groups and other such entities.

Q We are an implementing partner of a UN agency/NGO. Who will submit the proposal?

A The appealing organization. Implementing partners can be listed in the project sheet.

Q How are projects reviewed?

A The Sector Peer Review process will assess the overall quality, impact, feasibility, integration of cross-cutting issues, budgetary allocations, and strategic harmony of individual projects proposed by appealing partners, to avoid duplication and ensure alignment with prioritized activities based on assessed needs.

Q Does inclusion in the JRP guarantee that my project will be funded?

A No, this depends on how much funding is raised by the appealing partner. All appealing partners are expected to have a fundraising strategy.
