

### Context

The Joint Protection Monitoring (JPM) framework has been implemented by the Protection Sector since January 2022 to promote the systematic and regular collection, triangulation, and analysis of protection incidents and risks faced by Rohingya refugees in Cox's Bazar camps. The **Joint Protection Monitoring reports** provide a comprehensive understanding of the protection situation in the camps by offering periodic insights into protection incidents, risks, threats, and vulnerabilities. This joint monitoring approach ensures that the evolving protection landscape is analyzed in a consistent and coordinated manner. **Six partners**—UNHCR, IOM, IRC, DRC, Oxfam, and HI—conduct protection monitoring as a core part of their protection programs, covering all 33 camps. The report also reflects contributions from the **Child Protection (CP) and Gender-Based Violence (GBV) Sub-Sectors**, as well as the **Anti-Trafficking Working Group, Gender-Diverse Population Working Group, and the Housing, Land, and Property (HLP) Technical Advisor**. These collaborative efforts ensure a holistic analysis of the protection challenges faced by the Rohingya population in Cox's Bazar.

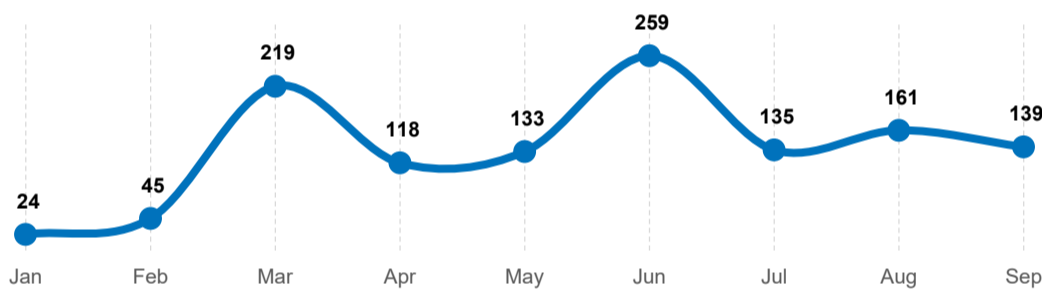

The Protection Sector led Joint Protection Monitoring (JPM) reported a total of 139 incidents in Cox's Bazar Rohingya Refugee Camps affecting 144 refugees during the month of September 2024.

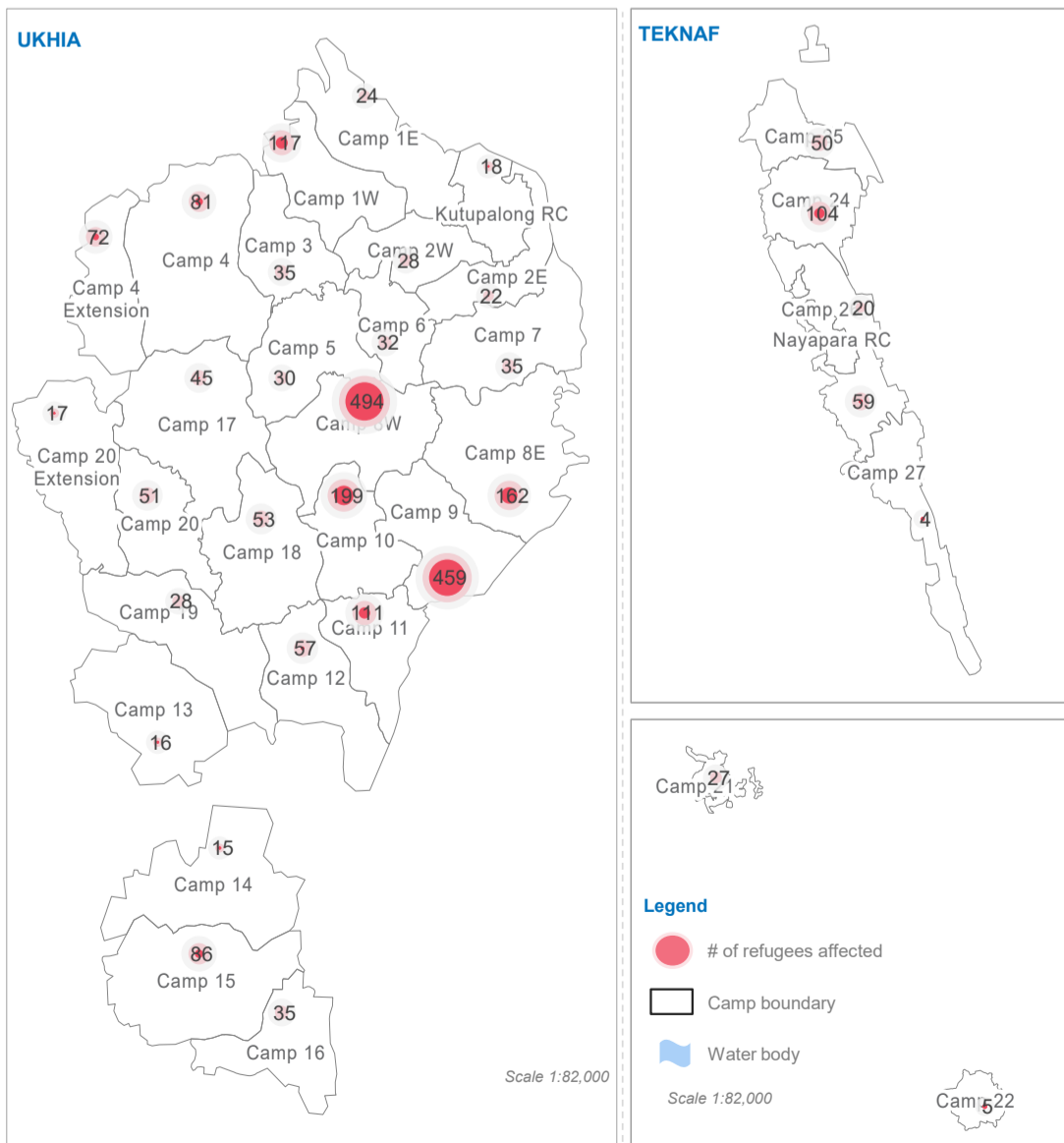
The most common types of incidents were abduction/kidnapping (48 incidents), followed by gunshots (35 incidents), serious physical assault (24 incidents), extortion (17 incidents), recruitment (9 incidents), and killing/murder/manslaughter (6 incidents).

Organized groups were identified as the main perpetrators, responsible for 68% of these incidents.

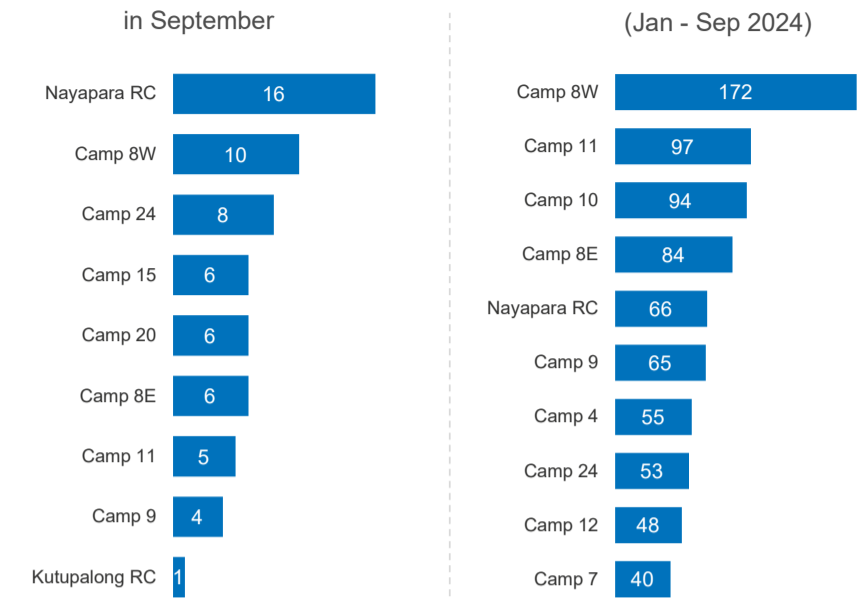
### Monthly trend (Protection incidents Jan - Sep 2024)



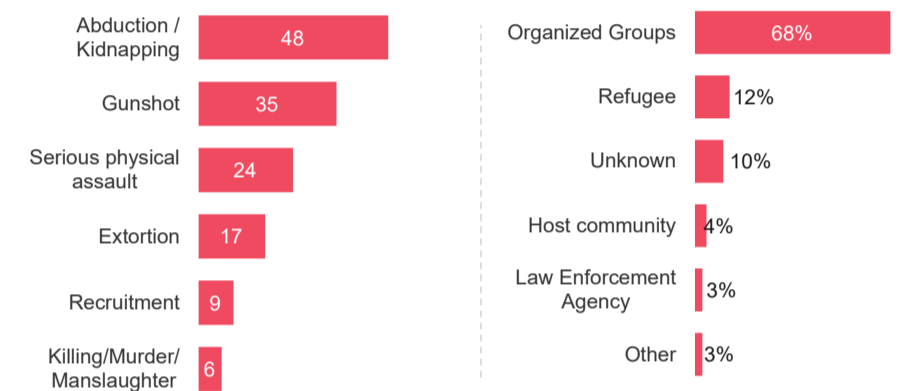
### Geographic overview (number of refugees affected by camp)



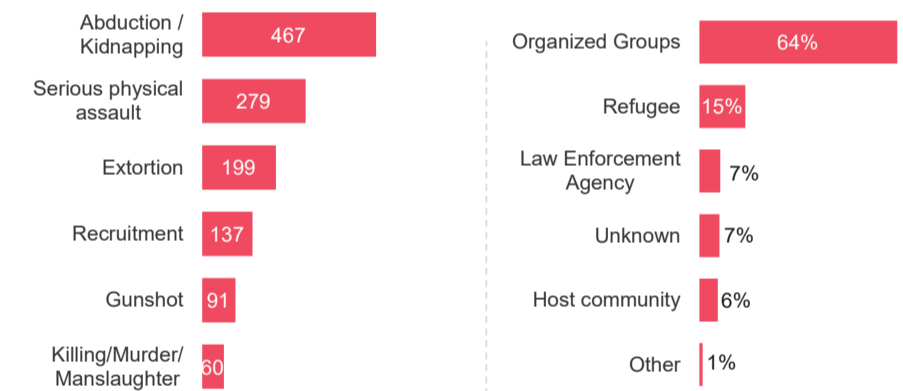
### Top 10 Camps by Incidents



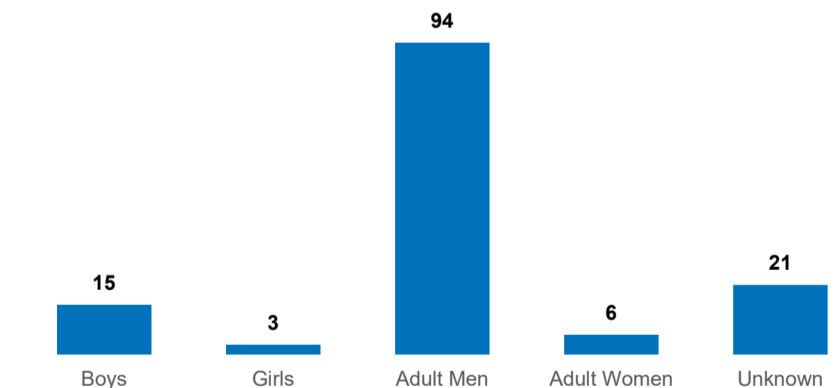
### Types of incidents and perpetrators (September 2024)



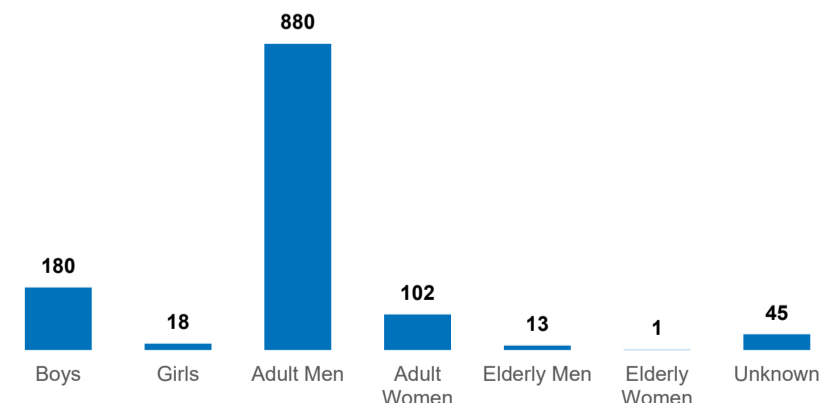
### Types of incidents and perpetrators (Jan - Sep 2024)
