PSEA Network Updates	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ Staff Training: Inter-agency PSEA training sessions began in August and continued through September. A total of 4 batches were conducted, reaching 87 UN and NGO staff. Network members supported the initiative by providing venues and facilitation. ✓ SOP Revision: The revised SOP for SEA Complaint Referral was shared with members for feedback. It will be presented to UNCT and ROCT for endorsement. Once approved, the SOP will be disseminated to members, and a rollout plan will be discussed. ✓ Safe Work Rule: The Safe Work Rule for Day Labourers was shared with all members in September 2025. Members are requested to implement this across operations. 	PSEA Network

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ Volunteer Training: Coordination is underway to train 1,452 volunteers across 33 camps through 66 batches of ToT. Sectors supported volunteer selection. The ToT for Bangladeshi national staff will be held on 15–16 October at Mukti Cox's Bazar office in Ukhiya, with 66 trainers expected to participate. ✓ Safe Recruitment Checklist: The HR Task Team has developed draft a Safe Recruitment Checklist for volunteers. Once finalized, it will be shared with members. ✓ IP PSEA Capacity Assessment Tool: Development of the harmonized IP PSEA capacity assessment tool is ongoing by the IP PSEA Assessment task team. Once finalized, it will be shared with members. 	
SEA Trend Analysis 2024-2025	<p>Victim profile</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Children: 53%; every 1 in 2 victims are children (slightly more than half). • Sex of victim: 42% female (2 in 5); 57% unknown (3 in 5) high data gaps limit gendered analysis. <p>Type of allegation</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Unknown: 64% (2 in 3) <u>this is the single biggest barrier to meaningful trend analysis.</u> • Sexual abuse: 16% (1 in 6) • Sexual exploitation: 8% (1 in 12) • Sexual harassment: 6% (1 in 17) <p>Among classified cases, 1 in 2 allegations are sexual abuse, 1 in 4 are sexual exploitation, and 1 in 5 are sexual harassment.</p> <p>Support provided</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Received support: 41% (2 in 5) • Unknown support status: 32% (1 in 3) <p>Location</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Cox's Bazar: 74% (3 in 4 cases) • Bhasan Char: 13% (1 in 8) 	N/A

Key Highlights:

✓ **High Risks for Children**

With every 1 in 2 victims being a child, joint action with the Child Protection Sub-Sector and Education Sector is critical to strengthen prevention and response. Priorities include establishing child-friendly reporting mechanisms, engaging caregivers, and promoting school-based PSEA and safeguarding awareness. This requires joint risk mapping in learning and child-friendly spaces to identify hotspots, supervision gaps, and high-risk activities; training teachers and facilitators on reporting obligations and safeguarding standards; and ensuring complaint channels preferred by children and caregivers, designed to be accessible, confidential, and culturally appropriate, such as trusted in-person reporting and safe hotlines, supported by clear handling procedures and language inclusivity.

✓ **Community Volunteers Identified as a Key Risk**

With one in two cases linked to Rohingya volunteers, the response must work collaboratively to strengthen safe recruitment, clarify roles, provide training, ensure supervision, and enhance community oversight. This includes implementing robust recruitment measures such as identity verification, reference checks, conflict-of-interest screening, and background checks; comprehensive onboarding with a clear code of conduct, safeguarding and PSEA training, defined role boundaries, reporting obligations, and sanctions; regular supervision through spot checks and rotation in high-risk roles; and reinforcing community accountability through feedback sessions, safe reporting channels outside volunteer structures, and visible information on how to report concerns.

- ✓ **'Unknowns' are masking real patterns:** Partners are requested to share data as per the revised SOP and the updated guidance from OSC-SEA.

The meeting noted inconsistency in SEA data sharing. All organizations were reminded to share SEA data with UNRCO within 24 hours of receipt, as per updated guidance from the Office of the Special Coordinator on SEA.

The findings from the analysis will be incorporated as priorities in the multi-year strategy and reflected in the upcoming annual action plan.
